Rationale for Changes:

27. Purebred Cornish Chickens are not used as meat animals in modern industry. Most of the contests that students have attended this year have used a picture of a Cornish Cross Broiler for this breed ID. This is incorrect per APA Standards. Cornish and Cornish Cross Broilers are distinctly different in many ways. I have included pictures and breed details below to highlight the differences.

Cornish Description:



“Standard Weight: Hens - 8 lbs, Cock - 10.5 lbs

Comb: Pea

Plumage: Short, Narrow, fitting closely in all sections.

Color Variations: Dark Cornish, White Cornish, White Laced Red Cornish” (APA Standard of Perfection)

Cornish Cross Broiler Description(generally Cornish crossed with Plymouth Rock and other heavy american breeds):



Standard Weight: Not to exceed 8 lbs at 6-8 weeks of age (for most county fairs).

Comb: Single

Plumage: Short, Sparse, Not fitting closely to the body (for ease of feather removal during processing)

Color: White Only (other colors are considered a defect by many judges in a market show because dark feathers leave marks on the skin after processing.)

28. White leghorns are the commonly used laying hen in commercial industry. Technically leghorn crosses are used as well (ex: Hy-Line), but most are primarily white leghorn and end

up looking like white leghorns. The breeds are technically distinctly different; however, pictures of the White Leghorn and Commercial Laying Crosses are extremely similar in weight, plumage, coloration, and comb type.

31-33. Duck is not a breed. It is a species. This is misleading for students studying a breed ID list. White Pekin is a recognized breed that is the most common breed used in duck meat production. Khaki Campbell & Runners are recognized breeds that are the most common breeds used in duck egg production.

34. Geese is not a breed. It is a species. This is misleading for students studying a breed ID list. Embden is the most common breed used in goose production.

35. Quail is not a breed. It is a species. This is misleading for students studying a breed ID list. Coturnix is the most common breed used in quail production.

36. Turkey is not a breed. It is a species. This is misleading for students studying a breed ID list. Broad Breasted White is the most common breed used in turkey production.
